Time to reconsider the Republic statue

The "Statue of the Republic" in Jackson Park at Lake Shore and layes drives is one-bird the size of the original one which was created for and destroyed after the 1880 Columbian Exposition. It was originally 100 feet high, including its base and weighed more than 100 tons. It was cald in 18-cart gold leaf. Both statues were created by sculptor Daniel Chester Percent to symbolize the maturity this country had achieved in the 400 years since Columbus. The statue is a Greec Forman style figure of a woman holding an eagle atop a glove and a standard with a wreth inscribed "Victory." The monument was recently restored and hand gilded with \$5.000 sheets of sold leaf.

In conjunction with a citywide celebration for the centennial of the 1980 World's Columbian Exposition, the competition is being held to expire and redefine the genre of the monument and examine the place of public art in the community today.
